# Pastor's Ponderings The Compassionate God

Sirach 18:8-9, 11-14: "What are mortals? What are they worth? What is the good in them, and what is evil? The number of their days seems great if it reaches a hundred years. That is why the Lord is patient with them

and pours out his mercy on them. He sees and understands that their death is wretched, and so he forgives them all the more. Their compassion is for their neighbor, but the Lord's compassion reaches all flesh, reproving, admonishing, teaching, and turning them back, as a shepherd his flock. He has compassion on those who accept his discipline, who are eager for his precepts."

I know some of you are frantically searching for the book of Sirach in your Bibles, but unless you have a copy of the Bible with the Apocrypha, you won't find it in our Protestant Bibles. The Book of Ecclesiasticus or the Wisdom of Jesus Son of Sirach is part of the Bible (or the Canon) for our Roman Catholic and Greek Orthodox brothers and sisters. However, it was left out of the Protestant Bible; of course, if Martin Luther had his way the Book of James would have been left out, too. In the Presbyterian Church, we believe that the books of the Apocrypha are not the same as the books in our Bible in that they aren't authoritative teachings that we have to follow, like the Ten Commandments or the Beatitudes. However, we do believe that these books, of which Sirach is but a part, are useful for teaching us lessons about God and the life of faith. In the spirit of learning from these ancient words, we look at this passage from Sirach 18:8-9, 11-14.

"Their [the people's] compassion is for their neighbor, but the Lord's compassion reaches all flesh, reproving, admonishing, teaching, and turning them back, as a shepherd his flock."

Compassion is defined as "sympathetic pity and concern for the sufferings or misfortunes of others." It comes from a Latin word meaning "to suffer with." Compassion is "suffering with another." It is being concerned about another's life and well-being. Sirach says that we have compassion — "sympathetic pity and concern"— only on those who are near to us. We have compassion on our neighbor, on those we love, on those for whom we care. We have compassion only when we know the person for whom we are feeling compassionate. But, according to Sirach, God's compassion is different. God has compassion on all people. God is concerned with everyone. He is seeking to bring everyone to him as a shepherd gathers his flock. Yes, God has compassion on *(continued on page 3)*

- 2. How often do we pray for our giving to missions outside of our community and our nation?
- 3. Are we compassionate toward those whom we don't like, who have hurt us, who are our enemies, and with whom we disagree?

God's compassion is on **all** flesh. We are called for our compassion to be the same.

## Musicale Group dazzles at afternoon concert



The Georgia Musicale Group (GMG) did not disappoint on Sunday, June 30, as three very accomplished pianists performed in a free concert at FPC. The group includes both amateur and professional musicians who are seeking opportunities to perform and to make it possible for more people to experience and enjoy classical music.

Mary Marshall Dekkers, a private piano teacher and former elementary school music teacher, played two pieces, "Etude Op. 25, Number 7" by Frederic Chopin and "Valse Etude" by William Gillock.

Dr. Utako Tanigawa, a computer systems professional, played pieces by Handel, Chopin, and Beethoven. She earned advanced degrees in data engineering and computer science after immigrating from Japan and held executive positions for more than 30 years. Dr. Tanigawa founded GMG in 2015 when a health crisis reawakened her interest in music.

Dr. Michelle Nam completed the afternoon's program. She is a professional pianist who has performed with symphonies across the world. After playing pieces by Bach and Beethoven,

she performed "Korean Rhapsody," a modern piece by Kenneth Park. It was the first time the piece had been played in public and the composer was in the audience.

The afternoon concluded with a dessert reception in Fellowship Hall. All of those in attendance enjoyed the concert and said they hoped GMG would come to FPC again. The group sent a generous donation to the church following the event.

## 100 years young and still going

Andy Negra, a frequent ONEsie, and a WorldWar II veteran, is like the EverReady battery as he keeps going and going. He turned 100 a few days before he flew to Normandy for the 80th Anniversary of D-Day. He landed on the Utah Beach in 1944 at the age of 19.

Attending the ceremonies was French
President Emmanuel Macron and afterward,
he personally pulled Negra aside to speak to
him. Then Andy received two hugs from First
Lady Brigitte Macron, which I know he thoroughly
enjoyed. At this 80th Anniversary there were
24 world leaders, two million participants in the
week long activities honoring the last survivors
of WWII.

In addition to meeting President and First Lady Macron, he met or saw the President of Norway, the mayor of Utah Beach, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, Prince William of England, President Joe Biden, officials from Delta and Michelin (both sponsors of this trip), and other dignitaries.

During the week he gave a speech at Utah Beach, in Normandy, France. He said his trip was the "most wonderful you'd ever believe." He is already planning to return to Normandy for the 81st anniversary next year.

We hope to have Andy Negra come and speak to our FPC family again sometime in the near future.

# Administration & Finance

### Mid-year financial update

As we begin the second half of our year, it is a good time to take a look at where we stand on our budget. We could wish that the plans that we made at the beginning of the year were a perfect forecast of what would occur. Well, some of the numbers are close to the plan and some are not. Just as we have seen increases in cost in our own personal budgets, the same pressure is on the expense side of our church budget. The Building and Grounds team really buckled down on our utilities costs and successfully reduced the kilowatt hours we used, but Georgia Power increased its rates and our hard work resulted in essentially no reduction in our bill. Similarly, just as we have experienced in our own costs at home, our insurance premium increased by over \$4000 this year.

Even with these increased costs, we have managed all our expenses very carefully and

spent less than our earlier estimates by 5 percent. Unfortunately, on the income side we are about 15 percent below the forecast. Most of those who pledged to give during our stewardship campaign are close to maintaining their commitment. The deficit that we are experiencing at mid-year is primarily due to a shortfall in our forecasted income from unpledged giving. This consists of offerings from those who choose not to pledge but still support the work of the church, and donations from visitors and other friends of the church.

We are still a very generous congregation when needs arise and our special funds and appeals are well-supported. We also have maintained a reserve that makes us very solvent even with the recent expense of a new roof on the Fellowship Hall.

Given the current economic times, as costs increase, we want you to be aware of where we stand financially, and how important it is to keep an eye on spending and also on giving.


The five groups responded to these three questions:

### The story of one heart attack

On the morning of June 16, I was sitting, drinking coffee, and reading. A dull ache developed under my sternum. I was led to believe that heart attacks knocked you to your knees. I walked through our bedroom, heading for the bathroom, and then had a dizzy spell – I lay down on the bed.

Rachel came in and was surprised to see me lying in bed. I said that I was having chest pains and dizziness. She said she would call 911. I asked her to wait a few minutes because the discomfort was so minor. After discussing the situation more, she insisted on calling 911. I said the fire station was close by and we should drive there. I did not want sirens and flashing lights. We drove to the Cleveland fire station, which took less than 15 minutes.

By the time we arrived, all the symptoms had vanished, and I was feeling foolish for coming. The man on duty asked me why I was there. When I answered that I had chest pains, he ordered me to sit down and got out some equipment. He and a female EMT ran some checks, which showed nothing. They called White County EMS because they have more sophisticated equipment. They arrived quickly and hooked up their equipment to me. It produced an EKG printout. The EMT said something looked suspicious in the waveforms

and that I should go to the ER in Gainesville. So we did.

I approached the ER desk and was asked what my problem was. When I told them I had chest pains, I was immediately hooked up to test equipment and blood was drawn. In a few minutes, the results came back showing a definite heart attack. I was put on a gurney and taken into the coronary care unit. The end result was four coronary bypasses. The recovery in the coronary care unit was unpleasant. I kept telling myself that I had not been singled out. Plenty of other people had experienced this before me. I was released from the hospital on June 27.

I cannot express enough how helpful and supportive my wife, Rachel, has been during all of this. I could not have made it without her. I thank the Heavenly Father for giving me some more time. I hope I can spend that time in a positive and constructive way.

I never, during all of this, experienced any of the classic heart attack symptoms. There was no real pain, just a nagging ache behind the sternum. There were no sweats, shortness of breath, pain down an arm, or nausea. My message to you is: when in doubt, go get checked.

Thanks, Roy, for sharing this important information. We're praying for your speedy recovery and are looking forward to seeing you and Rachel back in the sanctuary in the near future.
