

Pastor's Corner What is Love?

In 1993, Trinidadian-German musical artist Haddaway asked an important question to all those on the dance floor (and listening on the radio), "What is Love?"

According to my Google search, *Love* is defined as the following: 1) "an intense feeling of deep affection" and 2) "a great interest and pleasure in something." The Greeks were smart as they had four words for *love* that described different ways of loving: *storge* (affection), *philia* (friendship), *eros* (sexual love or "being in love"), and *agape* (charity). In English, the word *love* can describe our intense feelings about anything. We love our cars, our children, our favorite TV shows, and even our favorite type of French fry. We throw the word love around to the point that it loses all its meaning . . . all its intensity, passion, and "great interest."

So, that brings us back to the question raised by Haddaway: "What is love?" In our faith, we talk a lot about love, but we don't necessarily talk a lot about what it means to love. Of course, the best definition of love is found in 1 Corinthians 13, known as the love chapter. This beautiful statement on love, which is frequently read at weddings, was written to a church that couldn't get along to save its life. The members of the church at Corinth were divided over who was their favorite preacher, who had the most wisdom, and even, whose spiritual gifts were better. To this conflict-ridden church, Paul writes these words:

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant ⁵ or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable; it keeps no record of wrongs; ⁶ it does not rejoice in wrongdoing but rejoices in the truth. ⁷ It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

⁸ Love never ends. (1 Cor. 13:4-8).

The way Paul describes love is that it is not so much an adjective, describing how we feel, or a noun, the thing or one we love. It is a verb, an action. Love is feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, clothing the naked, and visiting those who are sick or in prison. Love shows kindness to the unkind. Love listens

An invitation to Realm



Several years ago, FPC subscribed to Realm

Church Management Software with the goal of improving the record-keeping and financial management of the church. As with most other "apps" available today, Realm makes it possible for the church to keep records up to date with less time and expense.

The Realm system also can benefit members of the church family. By logging on at your Realm account, you can:

- See the online church directory with photos, addresses, phone numbers, and email addresses. The information in the online directory is updated regularly.
- View a summary of your giving for the current year. If you have made a pledge, a graph will show how much of the pledge

has been fulfilled. Only you can see this record. You also can make one-time donations to the church from your page on Realm.

- Update your profile and your contact information.
- If you are in the Realm database but have never logged on, you will receive an email from the church office early in February. The email from info@fpccleveland.org will invite you to set up a password so you can access your account on Realm.

If you have set up a password in the past but have forgotten it, you can reset it yourself:

Click Sign In; Type in your email address; and Click Forgot Password.

My siblings in Christ, love is a choice we make every day. If we believe God is love, then we the children of God are called to mirror that love. We are to choose love, the love that "bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things," when the world chooses the easier path of hate and fear. We are called to choose love, even if we don't feel it, even if we don't want to do it, or even if we don't believe the other deserves it. "What is love?" It is the choice to live as children of our God who is love and whose love endures forever and ever. Amen.



Thank you to all who contributed the food, and for all the donations received.





Ministry Spotlight White County Food Pantry

The Ministry Spotlight for February is The White County Food Pantry (WCFP). The White County Food Pantry is located at 1342 GA-254, Cleveland. Hours of operation are Monday – Friday, 10 am – 12 pm. The food pantry is currently staffed by 40+ volunteers. There is no paid staff, the building is owned by the food pantry, and the property, upon which it is located, is leased from the White County School District for \$1 per year. To provide neighbors experiencing food insecurity with eggs, milk, frozen meat, fresh fruits, and vegetables, as well as shelf-stable foods, the food pantry relies on financial contributions from the community. Approximately 93% of each dollar donated is used to purchase food. Families who are experiencing food insecurity often have needs

that the food pantry can't fill; only food items can be purchased with financial donations. These needs include cleaning supplies, toilet paper, laundry detergent, dish detergent, shampoo, bar soap, liquid soap, etc.

In addition to providing financial support, the Session has voted to support the White County Food Pantry by collecting one specific needed item on the first Sunday of each month, beginning in February. In February, The item we will be collecting is *TOILET PAPER*. When you are shopping, please consider purchasing an extra package of toilet paper. Place your donation in the container in the lower narthex.




