Pastor's Corner A Change in Attitude

Right now, many of us are making our New Year's resolutions. We are vowing to start 2025 on the right foot. We are going to exercise more, eat better, and spend more time with God. All of these are wonderful, positive changes to make in our lives. But we may not be making the biggest change we need — a change in our attitudes.

Our attitudes matter. If we **believe** that we can achieve our New Year's resolutions, most of us will achieve at least one. Optimism breeds more optimism, both in ourselves and in those around us. When we are optimistic about our future, we are able to make the changes we need to achieve our goals. On the other hand, if we constantly tell ourselves that we will never change, most of us never will.

The same is true in the life of the church: optimism about God's future for the church leads to participation with God in the change he longs to bring. Pessimism breeds a resistance to change — the change from something old into a new creation in Christ.

Too often, this pessimism is couched in terms of looking at things "realistically." We say that we are being realistic when we tell ourselves and others that the church is dying and that the doors will be closing soon because attendance is down. Yes, it is realistic to say that attendance at our church is down. It is down for all denominations. But this pessimism denies all of the good things that are happening. It denies that God is still working in the life of the church. It says that there is no hope.

In his *Presbyterian Outlook* article "Two Kinds of Congregations," Tom Ehrich writes: "I see two kinds of congregations emerging ... the congregation that will survive and thrive and ... the congregation that will struggle, fall behind and, more often than not, die. The situation is critical. What will make the difference? Attitudes toward change and boldness in adapting to change. ... The difference will be a self-confident nimbleness as a new era unfolds, as opposed to wary rigidity."

A change in attitude changes everything. What if, instead of looking at everything that is going wrong in our congregations, we looked to see what is going right — the ways in which God is moving in us and through us? What if we believed and lived out in continued on page 4

Starting in January: A Year of Action

At a workshop on Nov. 19, your Session made plans for a Year of Action to follow the Year of Discernment. Several projects will take some time to develop, but we expect that 2025 will be a year of forming partnerships in our community and finding new opportunities for outreach and service.

Please continue to pray for God's guidance for our church as we step out in faith.

Partnering

Partnering with other area churches and service organizations will be explored during the year. Efforts will be made to strengthen current partnerships with Family Connection, the Friendship Nursing Home, White County Food Pantry, and others. A monthly "Ministry Spotlight" on the third Sunday of each month will focus on the work of these groups and how to get involved.

New partnering opportunities will be explored with the White County Senior Center and with other small-to-midsize churches in the Cleveland area.

Also, we plan to begin a collection for the Food Pantry on the first Sunday of each month, starting in February. Each month will feature a specific item that is most needed by the organization.

Outreach

In addition to current projects, such as the Crafts & Cars event in October and the Veterans Day Celebration in November, there are plans to hold a Blessing of the Animals on Saturday, Sept. 13. Friends and neighbors will be invited to bring their pets (or photos of their pets) to an outdoor service.

Service

The Session recognized that the church is uniquely gifted to meet an important need in the community: assisting the elderly and their caregivers.

This is expected to be a multi-year effort. During 2025, we plan to work to establish a

resource for caregivers of dementia patients. In cooperation with organizations such as the county Senior Center, the goal is to provide information, resources, and a support group for caregivers. If you have ideas, suggestions, or experience in this area, please contact Pastor Burnetta.

Many of the ideas and suggestions submitted during the Year of Discernment were related to the weekly Sunday worship services.

Sitting forward

In response to many requests, several back rows in the sanctuary will be roped off, starting on Jan. 5. The purpose is to bring the congregation closer to each other and to the pastor. It will also better reflect the actual number of people in the pews, from the perspective of those attending online. No one will be forced to sit "down front," but it would be great if everyone worked together to achieve this simple goal.

Departing from the traditional

On months with five Sundays (March, June, August, and November in 2025), the pastor and Worship Committee will plan a nontraditional worship service for the fifth Sunday. The details are yet to be determined, but some ideas are a hymn sing, an outdoor service, or a less structured order of service.

One decision has been made: Aug. 31 will be a "homecoming" service. Former members and attendees will be personally invited to join us on that day.

Thanks to all who participated during the Year of Discernment by submitting ideas, by joining in focus groups, and, most of all, by praying for God's guidance. This year will bring some changes for our congregation, but "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). Our mission has not changed, as we grow together by sharing Christ's love.

The congregation gathered at the flower-covered cross for the closing benediction of the Easter worship service.





Judy Winski, Betty Royds, Elaine Wiegert, and Lindalee Walters attended the Annual NEGA PW Gathering in Augusta.




The Youth Ministry Partnership gathered at FPC to assemble 100 hygiene kits for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA).

On November 30, 1997, our church was chartered by the Northeast Georgía Presbytery and Bíll Hínes was appointed Moderator.


He preached and donated his time until a new Pastor was called.

Paula, you will be missed.




